“MY” Peace Fellowship Program

Stipend (get paid): \$1000

Application deadline: May 15th, 2016

The Mike Yarrow Peace Fellowship (MYPF) endeavors to recruit and train high school students in the theory and practice of active nonviolence on issues of peace and social justice. Named to honor Mike Yarrow, the MYPF program is a **paid year-long fellowship for high school and college students** who want to gain skills in **organizing for peace and social justice**.

It's designed to help develop the ability of young organizers to create positive change through **nonviolent social action in their community**. It is run by Western Washington Fellowship of Reconciliation (WWFOR) in partnership with the Abe Keller Peace Education Fund. Peace Fellows learn about peace and justice issues, nonviolent movement building, and gain skills such as public speaking, group leadership, media development, conducting surveys, public relations, outreach, and lobbying. The Fellows meet individual activists, visit organizations, are introduced to current hot issues, and are mentored by experienced activists, public figures, and community organizers from the Seattle area and beyond.

The Mike Yarrow Peace Fellowship is awarded to a select group of high school and college students annually. **Applicants must submit a proposed community project or campaign with their application. Applications are available at:** <http://bit.ly/wwformpyf>

Mike Yarrow Peace Fellows receive a \$1,000 Fellowship Award and Certificate of Fellowship for successful completion of the program, as well as the training and support described on the next panel.

High school students contribute to ongoing research projects, and take part in workshops in ethics, communications, and scientific presentation skills. The program is designed to provide the student scientist with a solid foundation for future study.

Microsoft Young Technologist Seminar Internship:

Dates: June 27 - August 5, 2016

Location: Microsoft Redmond Campus

Stipend (get paid): \$4,800

Six-week seminar focused on productivity, communication and collaboration. During the first week, students will provide a personal report out on how they use technology and tools in their everyday life as students, friends, and young people in our society. For the remaining five weeks, participants will work together as a team to design and prototype an experience that they've identified as a gap/need. Young Technologists (YTs) will attend weekly hands-on trainings led by senior engineers and program managers designed to enhance existing technical skills as well as teach new ones.

Qualifications:

- Candidates must be a **college bound high school senior** or a college freshman or sophomore enrolled in a bachelor's degree program with a demonstrated interest in a related technical major.
- Students must have completed introduction to computer science (or an equivalent class) and one semester of college algebra (or equivalent) by the start of the program.

HIPRC's INSIGHT: Injury Student Internship Training Program offers an outstanding opportunity to work on a research project in the field of injury. Elite high school, undergraduate and graduate students are matched to projects and project tasks, partnered with University of Washington Medical School faculty. Students meet and learn from peers and health professionals from across the country. Bringing together a diverse group of young people interested in health care and research allows HIPRC to create a unique and rich resource for students who seek to learn more about what they can accomplish in the field of injury and injury prevention. Past research areas include elucidating the risk factors and causes of injuries, injury prevention strategies, acute and chronic care of injured patients, outcomes from trauma, and interventions to return the injured individual to their full potential.

Institute of System Biology:

This Seattle-based research institution sponsors an internship program during the summer for high school juniors interested in gaining microbiology, engineering, and computational research backgrounds.

The Baliga Lab opens their internship application each January on their careers website, enabling high school juniors to apply for a competitive, paid summer internship. This internship is much different than typically found in research labs. Systems biology allows students to work

with many specialists, directly involving the students in a variety of projects, using many types of technology and techniques. Students gain valuable microbiology, engineering, and computational experience. Due to the unique nature of this curriculum building and laboratory experience, students are highly engaged in creative problem solving as well as both independent and group learning. The internships are focused on bringing these key opportunities to students who typically would not have access to a professional work environment and a state-of-the-art research lab.

Summer Institute for Math at the UW (SIMUW):

SIMUW is a residential summer program run through the Mathematics Department. The program is for high school students with at least three years of high school math and an interest in mathematics and mathematics related careers. The program includes math coursework and exposure to careers and research involving math.

Dates: June 26 - August 6, 2016

Cost: \$4500 but financial help is offered if needed

Eligibility: Be a resident of Washington, 14 years old or older, completed the 9th grade by June 2016, completed three years of high school math--algebra, geometry, and trigonometry--by June 2016, cannot be a high school graduate upon arrival at SIMUW.
